Equitable Development | Get Online & Grow Online Social Media Campaign

In Q1, we hosted a social media campaign to promote local small businesses as part of our Get Online and Grow Online (GOGO) Program with the Urban Redevelopment Authority of Pittsburgh and City of Pittsburgh! Over several weeks, we featured over 30 different businesses – from restaurants to clothing retailers (and everything in between). We held interviews with entrepreneurs via Zoom, featured the food of restaurant-based businesses on our Instagram stories, held Instagram takeovers, and highlighted others with articles and social posts.

Round 1 and 2 of the program combined brought nearly 100 businesses to participate, half of which are minority-owned. Due to GOGO's success, we have begun offering the program on a rolling basis. We also launched our partnership with Bridgeway Capitlal's 'Open For Business' program in Q1. The collaboration will allow us to share, rather than replicate, important resources for small

In Q1, we released our 2020 Economic Opportunity Year In Review to share the progress we made through our Economic Opportunity Initiatives during 2020. We all know that 2020 was full of unexpected hardships related to the COVID-19 pandemic, from health and safety concerns, to losses in businesses, jobs and income, as well as widespread societal inequities that have been around much longer. Here at Neighborhood Allies, with our trusted partners and generous supporters, we expanded the reach of our Economic Opportunity initiatives and achieved significant outcomes in the lives of local families. From adapting to offer financial opportunity and financial empowerment counseling remotely, to launching the Pittsburgh Financial Inclusion and Disability Awareness Working Group, we are proud of what we accomplished with our partners last year.

Neighborhood Image | Public Art and Communities

In Q1, we kicked off our Call For Artists as part of our Public Art and Communities (PAC 2.0)) Program in collaboration with The Office of Public Art and the Borough of Millvale. The PAC Program invites four artists to create four temporary works of public art within the target gerographies of Hilltop (including Allentown, Beltzhoover, Knoxville, and Mount Oliver); Hill District; Wilkinsburg; Homewood; Larimer; Lincoln-Lemington; and the Triboro Ecodistrict. Each artist will collaborate with a community-based organizational partner to create an artwork that responds to the COVID-19 pandemic and addresses its intersection with other public health issues. In addition to developing a work of temporary public art, artists will participate alongside their organizational partner in Placemaking Academy, a series of workshops that will develop public art and creative placemaking skills. Market Confidence | Media Coverage: URA Board Approves Sale of Centre Avenue Site For Relocation and Expansion of Big Tom's Barbershop

PITTSBURGH, PA (March 12, 2021) The URA Board of Directors has accepted the redevelopment proposal and approved the sale of 2178 Centre Avenue and three adjacent lots in the Hill District to Thomas Boyd for \$21,000 plus costs to relocate and expand his business, Big Tom's Barbershop. 2178 Centre Avenue is the former home to Hamm's Barber Shop, an iconic building in the neighborhood. Mr. Boyd has operated Big Tom's Barbershop in the Hill for 15 years.

"We're just happy with all the efforts and we appreciate all the support from the URA, Councilman Lavelle, and all the people at Neighborhood Allies," Mr. Boyd said. "I want to push forward to get this development project going because I know it will do a lot to uplift the Hill District community and I'm thankful for the opportunity." Glenn Grayson, Jr.

Glenn has worked incredibly hard over the past year, and throughout the pandemic, and we want to recognize all of the work he has carried out during that time. Starting in April of 2020, Glenn organized and led our Paycheck Protection Program TA, helping nearly 25 businesses to retain over 120 employees and receive \$1.5 million in funds. He was able to coordinate a lot of people from several organizations to mobilize and help as many businesses as possible, all while learning the ins and outs of a brand new small business federal loan program. Throughout the rest of 2020, Glenn remained dedicated to supporting Hill



District small businesses and developers as our organization worked to advance our real estate concepts. Relationship-building is so important to this work, and we are confident that Glenn's personality and compassion for his neighborhood informs his work daily.

Demi's dedication to helping Homewood businesses sparked the Get Online & Grow Online (GOGO) program early-on in the pandemic. In addition to providing direct support helping businesses apply to PPP, she used her deep community connections to find out what, exactly, businesses needed. Demi was simply trying to make sure the small businesses in her neighborhood - that she and so many of her neighbors love - could survive the pandemic. Now, as we continue to adapt to new technology, GOGO will remain an important resource for many small businesses. GOGO has been literally life-changing for some of the small businesses that have participated. Now, Demi has found a



way to expand the GOGO program beyond the City to reach every single one of our focus neighborhoods. Amid all of that, Demi has also continued to manage and help launch 'The Homewood Experience.'

Tamara has gone above and beyond the standard workload, simultaneously managing our Love My Neighbor! program, while navigating public involvement in PAC 2.0, Design Justice work, and stepping up to assist with our Digital Inclusion work.
